Naturalist's Notes:

When winter really sets in, I thoroughly enjoy the barren treetops, cold air, and snow-kissed landscape- but something in me yearns for greenery.

The pines and spruces give a glimmer of green hope up high, but down below on the forest floor, the pine tree club moss gets my attention and admiration. They are small but loaded with character and have an amazing life cycle. The club mosses are an ancient plant that evolved 400 million years ago from the humble mosses. What sets them apart from their progenitors is a vascular system. This amazing new feature in the plant world let the club mosses send water from roots to its photosynthesizing leaves and gave rise to modern plants. A vascular system let plants finally sprout from the ground and grow up not just out. The club mosses of the past were of all shapes and sizes, including 100-foot-tall treelike specimens. Over time, evergreens and the flowering trees and plants took over- but a handful of primitive club mosses still thrive today. The club mosses reproduce with a unique life cycle that uses spores instead of seeds that grow, not into a new plant like its parents, but a tiny soil dwelling gametophyte that could spend years developing. This gametophyte produces sperm and eggs that develop into a new adult plant that grows slowly and never gets taller than 12 inches. We find these tiny wonders here at the Nature Center and I look forward to the contrast between their bright green treelike forms and the sleeping winter forest. 

Appreciation to the Closter DPW For Stream Clearing Assistance

Land Use: Nature Center volunteers, particularly Tom Golodik and Gay Mayer, do timely and often strenuous work to keep our trails open, and our many streams flowing unobstructed. But sometime the tasks are beyond human capacity and mechanical help is needed. This is particularly true of Smith Brook where the stream crosses under Irving Avenue. All manner of upstream debris is carried on flood waters toward this culvert. Material that can't fit through the culvert gets tangled in front, blocking the flow. Backed-up water floods the woodlands, rising close to the level of the road. When heavy, water-logged stumps and branches are present, the DPW comes to the rescue, using a backhoe to clear the blockage and restore the flow. As with plowing of our parking lot and major help when we drained our pond, Superintendent Bill Dahle and Closter's DPW crew offer valuable assistance to the well-being of the Nature Center.
