Christmas Bird Count – Get to Know Your Winter Neighbors: The Birds in Your Yard

On Saturday, December 19th, from 10 AM to 1 PM, the Nature Center will host an "Open Porch" for backyard birders —an opportunity to drop by the cabin by the pond and join others in observing and identifying the birds that are common to Closter throughout the winter.

These birds are bright bits of outdoor color, energy, and activity, while we stay snug in our homes. Bring binoculars if you have them. We have some

to loan, as well as a chance to look through a powerful telescope as if the bird is sitting on your hand! Stop by and get to know these perky wonders of winter survival.

Naturalist's Notes:

When scheduling science programs and hikes, I am often asked to focus on specific topics.

Since most of the Nature Center's educational programs are designed to support the curriculum of our local schools, I am more than happy to zero in on things like ecology or animal adaptations, but when things are left up to me, I leave it up to nature! More often than not, momentary gifts from the forest can be better than hours of painstaking preparation.

The most recent example occurred last week when I had "planned" to talk about how animals make it through the winter. My outline about migration, hibernation, brumation and diapause went out the window just five minutes into our hike, when a pileated woodpecker flew over heads and landed in a dead ash tree a hundred feet away. The woodpecker proceeded to peck away at the fragile bark of the dead tree, securing its dinner of dormant insects. Voila! My lesson for the day.

I couldn't have planned it better myself. The whole show lasted about three minutes, but we got several chances to see it fly, land, and eat. Being so large, conspicuous, and common, you would think that we would see these birds on every hike- but no, they can be a bit tricky to find. I guess we were lucky that day.

Actually, we were lucky *and* ready to see what the forest had to show us. Being ready for and finding the gifts that nature offers is a major facet of the art of nature observation and appreciation that I try to instill in all of my students. This holiday season, keep in mind that nature has wonderous presents for all of us. All we have to do is get outside, open our eyes and ears and be ready to receive them!

Important Native Species Preserve Update, and Call for Volunteers

The fierce winds that blew through the area over the weekend of November 15th caused significant damage to the fencing around two of the three deer exclosures in our preserve. The exclosures, which are an important part of the CNC's Forest Stewardship program, are designed to keep deer out of designated areas to determine what impact deer browse has on the forest's understory. Similar areas inside and outside the exclosures have been marked off and are being compared as part of a long-term study to assess overall growth and to identify plant species present in each.

Several trees felled by the wind crashed atop the eight-foot fences around the Red and Blue exclosures, knocking down more than 100 feet at the Red and 75 feet at the Blue. Closter Nature Center Trustees Elizabeth Ravit and Tom Golodik, naturalist Marc Gussen, and volunteers Rupert Bowen and Sarah Bowen worked in extremely swampy conditions on November 16th and 17th to remove the downed trees and fully repair the breaks in the fence.

CNC members who would like to assist in the monitoring and repair of this important fencing project can make their interest known by filling out the form on the "**Volunteers**" page on the Nature Center's website, <u>Closternaturecenter.org</u>. Volunteers should be willing to commit an hour to walking a fence line and willing to do a circuit at least once or twice a month on a long-term basis. The exclosures are off the preserve's trails, so walking around each can be difficult, strenuous and, depending on the conditions, can involve standing water, mud and snow. Calf-high rubber boots are a required dress item. Volunteers can either perform repairs themselves or report back to the Nature Center when they find areas that need attention. For those willing to resolve breaks in the fence themselves, tools, repair supplies, safety glasses and work gloves are available to fencing volunteers at the Cabin.
