## Winter Break Science Program

Need something fun and educational for the kids to do during the Winter break? We'll have four days of nature exploration and discovery here at the Closter Nature Center! It is imperative that kids dress appropriately for the weather, as we plan to be outside as much as possible. Mask wearing is mandatory if we go inside the Nature Center building.

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## Naturalist's Notes:

The surface of Ruckman Pond might be frozen, but life down below is going on strong. Even with a covering of ice, enough light often makes it into the water for many of the plants to do photosynthesis and produce food and oxygen for the pond's varied inhabitants. While some of the pond's major players like turtles, snakes, and frogs close up shop and hibernate for the winter, fish and many insects remain somewhat active. Many fish feed all winter in preparation for early spring spawning. There is no summer bonanza of food choices, but with the young of the year fish, (fish born last spring), and a variety of insects and plankton, no one is starving. Although there might be ice on the surface of the pond and air temperatures below zero, the water under the ice is quite a bit warmer.

The density of water varies with temperature in funny ways. When water freezes and becomes ice, it becomes less dense than liquid water and it floats. Freshwater is at its maximum density when it reaches 38 degrees. This dense water sinks and replaces warmer deeper water until the whole pond is all 38 degrees- and then with low air temperatures, the water at the surface gets colder and starts to freeze. It's easy to be misled by that coating of ice and think that pond life is "frozen" until spring, but a lot can happen down below at a balmy 38 degrees.

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## **BOARDWALKS BEING RESTORED!** The Story of a Community Effort

A major renovation of the boardwalks along three of the Closter Nature Center's trails--the Blue, Red and Green--was completed on January 13th and 14th, thanks to significant help from the **Closter Department of Public Works and Bradbury Landscape**.

Planning for this project began in 2020 when Trustee Mary Mayer, who participated in the original construction of our boardwalks nearly 20 years ago, saw that some planks were beginning to fail. The black locust planks were installed to make walking in the woods possible in all seasons by bridging particularly wet, muddy areas along sections of five trails. The wetlands nature of our forest can leave sections of the trails exposed to flooding and mud during heavy precipitation.

Mary developed a sketch depicting the various sections of trails that have boardwalks, highlighting which boards required replacement. Tom Golodik translated the sketch into an Excel spreadsheet, providing each plank with a number and a condition.

Continued monitoring showed that, of almost 600 boards, 80 boards of varying lengths needed replacement: 15 percent of the total. As the CNC Board moved to begin the needed work, Mary and her husband, Gay Mayer then provided a substantial donation to fund a portion of the \$8,000 needed for the purchase of suitable lumber.

Following a lengthy search for a timber supplier, Tom made contact with Lifetime Locust, a firm located in Broadalbin, NY, near Saratoga, who were able to provide what was needed. The new

planks were delivered to the Nature Center on Dec. 29, with unloading assisted by Closter's DPW.

Todd Bradbury, of Bradbury Landscape, a Closter resident and great friend to the CNC who has been involved in many improvements, quickly agreed to assist in the plank replacements. Just prior to the start of installation, Closter Public Works Superintendent William Dahle offered a crew and trucks to move the new planks, that had been delivered to the Boy Scout cabin, to needed locations along the trails, carry out old planks that had been removed, and dispose of them.

Enough planks remain for repairs to the Orange Trail, which starts at the bridge off the White Trail and runs through the swamp and phragmites. Planning for that work is underway now.

The generous offers of professional help turned what seemed to the Board to be a months-long project into a two-day effort!
