Strange Connections: Poison Ivy and Oriental Lacquer

October 23rd, 2024, 7 PM at the Log Cabin

Many individuals experience allergic reactions to poison ivy, as well as related plants like poison oak and sumac. The culprit behind this discomfort is urushiol, a compound found in the sap of these plants. Interestingly, urushiol is also a key component in the traditional craft of Asian lacquerware. The upcoming lecture will delve into urushiol's properties, how it triggers allergies, and its role in the creation of exquisite oriental lacquer items. **Michael Malin** will be the speaker for this fascinating presentation.

Naturalist's Notes:

As we face new threats to the future of our forests such as deer over-population, invasive species and climate change, we have been forced to take a more active role in the stewardship of the Closter Nature Center's 136 acres of forested wetlands. It has been a non-stop learning experience on our part to understand what we have, where we have been, and what we want the forest to be. My goal is to preserve the diversity of the native members of our forest community.

We have seen the decline in diversity of species as a problem across the globe, and we are now experiencing it right here in Closter. Our forest understory that has supported hundreds if not thousands of species of plants, insects, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals has been turning into a collection of invasive plants with little to no benefit to wildlife.

As these problems continue we have seen an inability of the forest to regenerate naturally. Tree and shrub seedlings are unable to grow to replace old trees, and the forest floor is picked clean of many of the plants that belong here and are needed by other forest community members.

We are not taking this sitting down!

We have numerous projects and initiatives to address and solve these problems, and we would love for the human members of our community to get involved. Come by the Nature Center, or visit our website to learn more about our 1st Annual Hike-a-Thon, our Reforestation Program, and a upcoming presentation at the Closter Library informing on these issues, and what we can do to insure that we have this magical gem of a forest loaded with a diversity of native plants and wildlife for future generations to enjoy, love and explore.
